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INTRODUCTION

The Redback Phonics Readers provide children in early primary with phonetically decodable reading practice. Sight words and proper nouns are introduced gradually, and there are carefully chosen glossary words which most early stage readers will not have encountered before.

This series presents non-fiction subjects and exciting images that will keep young readers turning the pages to see what comes next. The words, sentence lengths and punctuation have been selected to give children practice in using the phonics and grammar rules they have been learning in class.

There are over 140 titles in the Redback Phonics Readers, each with colourful layouts and bright, engaging images that add to the meaning of the text and encourage discussion.

AGE AND READING LEVEL

Redback Phonics Readers are aimed at the average child towards the end of Grade 2. An advanced learner in earlier years, or a struggling learner in later years, will also be able to practise reading using this series. The age in years will vary from about 6 to 8, with an interest level of up to 11 for struggling readers.

This series is aimed at children who have already been shown the English alphabet sounds. There are about 44 of these altogether, depending on the letters and sounds program a teacher chooses to refer to. One such system was the UK's Letters and Sounds. This system begins with SATP, INMD, etc. and continues until all of the most common graphemes are taught. This will usually occur when a child will be at the end of Grade 2 in primary or elementary school. They will then need practice using all the sounds they have been learning. It is at this stage that the Redback Phonics Readers are used. They provide decodable reading practice based on all the alphabet sounds and basic graphemes and phonemes.

SIGHT WORDS

Sight words are usually introduced during the basic learning stages up to the end of Grade 2. Most teachers use lists that are based on three levels, from simple to more complex. The sight words used in Redback Phonic Readers combine all these levels, since the series is aimed at children who have completed their basic phonics training already. The proper nouns used in the series are chosen as the ones most often encountered, and which therefore need to be learned as sight words as early as possible.

MEANINGFUL TEXTS

Since the reading level of the Redback Phonics Readers is aimed at children who have already reached the end of their basic decodable phonics training, the next step is to use their decoding skills by reading texts that are meaningful and written in normal English language style. The basic decodable readers that children will have used in the past are all not written in a normal language style, since they must carefully restrict the word usage to only ones that have the letters and phonemes being taught at the particular stage. After these decodable basic stages are completed, the role of the Redback Phonics Readers is to provide meaningful content that is more in the style of the books they will be encountering later.

The use of images in the Redback Phonics Readers is very important as a way of providing prompting and context as an aid for beginner readers. The new, 'meaningful' style of reading will be different for them, after only having experienced decodable phonics style, so extra assistance is needed at this changeover stage. The Redback Phonics Readers sit between decodable phonics booklets and actual, real novels and non-fiction books.

Blending and segmenting practice throughout the Redback Phonics Readers comes from the use of words that offer a range of opportunities. The Redback Phonics Readers do not do the initial introduction of phonics, but provide practice using meaningful text, once the graphemes and phonemes have been taught in class, using other decodable phonics booklets.



IMAGE LITERACY

Since the introduction of AI, skill in using and understanding images is more important now than it has ever been. The images in Redback Phonics Readers are all chosen for their information content, colourful presentation and interesting subjects. By showing children how to look at an image to extract more information on a topic, they will be ready to spot fakes more easily and to look at all images critically.

- 1. Ask children to share their ideas about what the image means.
- 2. Is the image realistic?
- 3. Is there any time that a fake image is useful?
- 4. Is the image meant to be funny or to make them feel an emotion?
- 5. What extra information can they learn from the image?
- 6. Ask them to write or say 3 words to describe the image.

SYLLABUS

The content of Redback Phonics Readers has the added advantage of covering topics that are introduced in most early syllabuses. This give children a purpose in their reading, showing them that their reading skills have a real use beyond just decoding individual, stand-alone words. They are learning about their world, and covering topics that they need to understand in class.

SELF-SELECTION

All the Redback Phonics Readers are a similar reading level and length. This means that children who are permitted to choose their own for reading will all encounter the same standard of text, making comparisons between children in the class easier for teachers.

An advantage of having the same reading level across multiple titles is that beginner readers who can read one book will usually be able to read any of the others as well. This encourages reading for beginners, as it builds confidence, which is one of the most important emotions necessary for a successful reading experience.

GRAPHEMES AND PHONEMES

There are 26 letters in the English alphabet, but these produce at least 44 different phonemes. A phoneme is a separate sound. When we want to write that phoneme, we use one or more of the 26 letters. Sometimes, there can be multiple letter groups that represent the one phoneme.

Children learning to read and write can start by learning all these 44 phonemes and how to spell them. Spelling requires the learning of graphemes. A grapheme is the way a phoneme is written with letters. Each grapheme represents just one, complete sound in a word.

There are a number of different reading systems that present the phonemes in various orders. The Letters and Sounds sequence used in the UK has been widely accepted as a useful sequence in which to introduce the phonemes. However, most educators agree that there is not just one sequence that is the only correct one. The important point in phonics is that there is an orderly presentation of phonemes, in which each stage builds on the sounds and letters already learned.



DIFFERENCE BETWEEN DECODABLE READERS AND PHONICS READERS

Decodable Readers - These books introduce the graphemes, one by one, in a specified sequence. Children start to learn one grapheme at a time, practise it, then move on to the next. Since the words presented can only include the graphemes already learned, the style of writing in decodable readers is stilted and unnatural, but very necessary for the learning process.

By the time they have been presented with all 44 phonemes, children are usually at the end of second grade or year 2 in primary or elementary school. By this time, they no longer need to read only the words that present a particular grapheme. They should be able to decode unknown words using the knowledge of the phonemes and graphemes they have been taught all the way from kindergarten.

Phonics Readers - By the end of second grade, children need texts that are more natural in their language style, but that still pay close attention to the phonics that children have learned. This is where Redback Phonics Readers are useful. They provide reading practice, using words that can be decoded with all the skills that children have learned about phonemes and the graphemes that represent them. For example, when trying to sound out an unknown word, children using phonics readers need to be able to remember that vowels can have long or short sounds, and that many consonants have hard or soft sounds.

PHONEME PRESENTATION SEQUENCE

This sequence for presenting the alphabet sounds is based on the one suggested by the UK Letters and Sounds system as follows:

S, A, T, P
I, N, M, B
G, O, C, K
CK, E, U, R
H, B, F, FF, L, LL, SS
J, V, W, X
Y, Z, ZZ, QU

EXPLICIT TEACHING

The explicit teaching method has been the subject of a number of studies that have determined it is a very effective way of teaching children to read in English.

The main steps are:

- 1. Teacher presents the new phoneme to be learned and models how it is said and written
- 2. Children practise what they have been shown and heard
- 3. Children produce their own work by reading and writing, showing they have understood how to use the phoneme presented

Redback Phonics Readers can be used in the third step to show that the 44 phonemes have been learned and their graphemes can be read and sounded out when a new word is encountered.

SOUNDING OUT UNKNOWN WORDS

Remind beginner readers to try all the sounds for a letter if the first one they use does not produce a word they recognise. For example, in the word 'face', children might first use the hard 'c' sound before they next try the soft 'c' sound to end up with the correct pronunciation.



SILENT LETTERS

Words with silent letters do not all follow any easy rule for spelling in English, so these sorts of words need to be memorised. Here is a list of the most common words with silent letters:

TAKE-HOME READERS

Each Redback Phonics Reader is short and interesting, making them all useful for take-home reading practice. A child can usually finish reading a single book in one reading session, giving them the necessary sense of achievement that makes reading a positive experience.

With over 140 titles, there are plenty of topics so that children can select ones that suit their personal interests. Allowing children to choose their own readers is likely to result in a more positive approach to reading at home than if they are required to read a book that is selected for them. Since all the Redback Phonics Readers are at a similar reading level and length, any title can be chosen.



DIGRAPHS, TRIGRAPHS, TETRAGRAPHS

Digraphs

These are 2 letters together than make one sound or phoneme. Here is a selection of digraphs:

ai, ar, au, aw, ay, ch, ck, ea, ea, er, ew, ey, ie, ir, ng, oa, oe, oi, oo, ou, ow, oy, ph, sh, ss, th, ue, ui, ur, wh

Split Digraphs

There are 5 split digraphs that consist of 2 vowels separated by a consonant. When this occurs, the first vowel produces its long sound:

a_e, e_e, i_e, o_e, u_e

Double Letters

Some letters are doubled in words. When the letter is a vowel, this usually, but not always, means that the double letters are to represent the vowel's long sound:

aa, bb, cc, dd, ee, ff, gg, ll, mm, nn, oo, pp, rr, ss, tt, uu, zz

Not all double letters represent a single phoneme. For example, 'skiing'.

Trigraphs

These are 3 letters together than make one sound or phoneme:

air, are, dge, ear, eau, eer, eir, ere, ier, igh, oar, oor, ore, oul, our, tch, ure

Tetragraphs (Quadgraphs)

These are 4 letters together than make one sound or phoneme:

augh, eigh, ngue, ough

QUICK TIPS AND SUMMARY

SPEED: Give children time to break unfamiliar words into their individual units of sounds.

DECODING: Support children to combine the different sounds to create the word.

SOUNDING OUT: Give help with 'sounding out' when needed. Take note of sound groups that need further practice.

SIGHT WORDS: Sight words should be learned so there is no need to sound out each time.

FINGER READING: Using a finger to follow along the line of text can help beginner readers.

IMAGES: Talking about the images will help improve vocabulary.

TRICKY WORDS: Let the child know it is alright not to know all the words.

PROGRESS: Ask the child to read aloud so you can check their progress.

READ TWICE: Ask the child to do a second reading silently.

COMPREHENSION: After reading, ask the child questions on what the book was about.

ENJOYMENT: Make reading a fun task and not a serious chore to be avoided
